Family-Engaged Developmental Monitoring

Help Me Grow National has developed a Roadmap for Advancing Family-Engaged Developmental Monitoring (FEDM). FEDM is defined as an intentional partnership of families and providers working to highlight a child's developmental progress and identify opportunities for support and education for positive outcomes. The three essential attributes of FEDM include:

- Families are regarded as the expert on their child's development
- Information is gathered to inform a holistic approach to the child's development
